### **AIANH / New Hampshire Architecture Foundation Awards Scholarships**

**Keene, NH** – The New Hampshire Chapter of the American Institute of Architects (AIANH) and the New Hampshire Architecture Foundation (NHAF) have announced the recipients of their jointly sponsored scholarship programs for New Hampshire residents. \$1000 grants were given to Hilary Barlow of Salem, NH, entering her fifth year in the Bachelor of Architecture program at Syracuse University; Michael Kulikowski from Merrimack, NH, entering his fifth year in the Bachelor of Architecture program at Virginia Tech; and Mathew Arsenault of Hampstead, NH, who is starting his second year in the Wentworth Institute of Technology architecture program.

The AIANH-NHAF Scholarship has two grant categories, one for students who are currently enrolled or accepted to an accredited undergraduate or graduate professional architecture degree program. This scholarship is supported in part by a grant from the AIA Component Matching Grant Program. The other is for students currently enrolled in or accepted to an accredited undergraduate program with a major in architecture or related field, such as landscape architecture, architectural history, architectural preservation, and planning.

The scholarships were presented by AIANH president Dale Doller AIA and Jim Loft AIA, president of the NH Architecture Foundation, at a recent AIANH meeting and building and site tour of the newly renovated facilities at Hampton Beach State Park, Hampton, NH, designed by Samyn D'Elia Architects.
